It may make sense to sell off certain state properties to enrich currently underfunded state coffers. It makes no sense to sell off any and all such properties where the public interest clearly dictates a public use as the best use. When Queens Civic Congress formed, its earliest major project was to preserve for public use, 32 acres at Creedmoor that state sought to sell for development. Queens Civic Congress organized the communities, developed a Master Plan for Creedmoor, presented it at a meeting with the State at the Office of the Borough President. What was once the Glen Oaks Campus and renamed a few years back, The Padavan Campus, resulted. Queens Civic Congress will continue to work with its member organizations to prevent any ill-advised disposition of public lands.
