Queens Civic Congress 2009 Candidates Survey

Land Use/ Zoning

Will you support retaining zoning regulations that subject development of big box stores to public land review in most NYC neighborhoods? *Yes*

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Will you support legislation enabling the city to force violators to comply with Zoning Resolution and Building Code violations? *Yes*

Will you support legislation authorizing City Council review of BSA decisions?

I believe the BSA is in need of reform and would consider a number of approaches.

How do you envision the role of community boards in planning for neighborhood growth, budgeting and quality of life issues.

I will advance principles of development to engage all parties in the land use process (Community Boards, Borough Presidents, the City Council, neighborhood residents, developers, and City Planning) in an approach to development that is thoughtful, responsible and inclusive. For too long, New York City has approved land use changes for developments that end up having profound impacts on communities and doing little to further their needs. Development that reflects the needs of a neighborhood will help us to maintain the diverse cultural, social and environmental fabric of New York City. Through my appointee on the City Planning Commission, community organizing, and collaboration with elected officials, I will promote the following principles of development:

--Communities should expect developers to engage in open dialogue throughout the planning and construction stages of each project.

--Communities should ask for and developers should provide detailed information about how a project intends to further the social welfare of the community in areas such as affordable housing, creation of living wage jobs and commitments for local hiring, space for schools, increased child care capacity, opportunities for locally owned and minority/women owned businesses, and space for not-for-profit organizations.

--Broadening the reach of diversion programs to ensure that, whenever possible, youth stay out of detention and out of Family Court, but take responsibility for their actions and receive the services they need to stay out of trouble.

--Extending the availability of community based alternatives to detention to all youth who are involved in juvenile delinquency proceedings but who can continue to live in their communities without posing a risk to public safety.

Building and Code Enforcement

Will you sponsor legislation-called for by the Queens Civic Congress—to give the city authority to issue summons by DOB, FDNY and HPD to property owners who refuse accesss to their properties where a complaint of an illegal use exists.

I agree that the City should have an effective mechanism for gaining access to properties with complaints of an illegal use.

Would you rescind the Department of Building's Rules 105-03 and 105-04 which limit challenges by the public to new construction for a period of 45 days after the issuance of work permits? *Yes*

Water Rates

Will you sponsor legislation to abolish the NYC Water Board whose only function seems to be to raise revenue for whichever Mayor happens to occupy City Hall?

We cannot continue to automatically raise water rates every time the sewer and water system need more funds. We must seriously consider all options to reduce the strain on New Yorkers and bring costs down.

In view of the exponentially rising property taxes and water use charges, will you support returning the cost of water supply and treatment facilities capital expenses to New York City's capital budget?

I support considering this approach.

New Yorkers are fed up with so called enforcement of quality of life violations. Will you support legislation to authorize traffic and other enforcement agents issue summonses for dumping, littering and similar offenses?

We must improve quality of life issues for all New Yorkers and must employ a variety of strategies to do this, including those relating to enforcement.

Parks/ Concessions

Will you support calls by park advocates for changes in the rules for major concessions that will require public review of changes in the use, design and configuration of parks, playgrounds and major features therein?

I agree that we need greater public input and review for a wider range or proposals, such as major concessions.

Will you support tightening rules for major concessions?

I agree that we need greater public input and review for a wider range or proposals, such as major concessions, and should consider rule changes.

Discretionary Funding

How will you decide which groups to support with City Council member funds?

The Public Advcate does not allocate such funds. However, I believe that while we have made improvements over the past several years, we need greater transparency in the City Council budget process. In order to be eligible to receive any City Council funding, an organization should be required to successfully complete an eligibility application process that would begin in the fall prior to the June budget. This eligibility application would consider elements such as an organization's funding history, the percentage of the organization's budget comprised of City Council funding, possible conflicts of interest between the organization and any member of the City Council, government inquiry or investigation history, and record of service provision.

These eligibility applications would be evaluated by an independent body, designated by the Council, using a formally established and publicly available set of criteria. Only organizations deemed eligible by this body would be able to receive Council funding for the coming fiscal year.

How will you respond to situations where a group seeking funding employs a person who is your relative or is a relative of a staff member?

The Public Advcate does not allocate such funds. However, all conflicts of interest, including the appearance of a conflict of interest, should be plainly disclosed. Eligibility applications would be made available in a publicly searchable database. All information contained in the applications, including conflicts of interest, would be included in the database.
